MINUTES OF COUNCIL

A regular session of Troy City Council was held on Monday, January 4, 2021, at 7:00 p.m. at the Bravo Room of Hobart Arena.

INVOCATION & PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE: An invocation was given by Mayor Oda, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

MINUTES: The Clerk gave a summary of the minutes of the December 21, 2020 meeting of Troy City Council. There were no corrections or additions to these minutes. Upon motion of Mr. Schweser, seconded by Mr. Schilling, these minutes were approved by unanimous roll call vote.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Community & Economic Development Committee: Mrs. Snee, Chairman, reported that Committee recommends legislation be prepared to approve the Revised Final Record Plan of the Troy Christian Schools Education and Performing Arts Facility Planned Development-Residential, as recommended by the Troy Planning Commission. Report submitted by Rozell, Twiss and Snee.

Community Partnerships Committee: Mr. Rozell, Chairman, reported that Committee reviewed the legislative items required to establish a Property Assessed Clean Energy (PACE) Program to finance energy efficient and renewable energy projects. This program, established by State Law, is an additional economic development incentive tool to help businesses and industries make qualifying physical improvements to a property which creates energy savings and to finance the improvements and pay back the cost of the improvements through a special assessment added to the property tax over a period of 15-25 years. Once an initial application is approved, which includes creating an Energy Special Improvement District (ESID) for the properties covered by an application, the District can be expanded to include other properties or the entire City. The City has received an application to establish the program for improvements at 224-226 S. Market Street. Committee recommends that legislation be prepared to establish a PACE program, including an Energy Special Improvement District (ESID), and approve the application for 224-226 S. Market Street. The Committee also supports emergency legislation so that the program can be established and the submitted application approved. The Committee noted that there will actually be three pieces of legislation to be considered:

1. Resolution of Necessity (which includes establishing the Troy ESID)
2. Ordinance to Proceed
3. Ordinance Levying Assessments

Report submitted by Allen, Schweser and Rozell.

Finance Committee: Mr. Schweser, Chairman reported that Committee recommends legislation be prepared to authorize the Director of Public Service and Safety to execute a subordination loan agreement with Greenville Federal Bank for the SBD loan R&E, LLC which will permit the company to restructure their commercial debt and purchase of an additional industrial zoned property in Troy. In that both R&E, LLC and Greenville Federal Bank wish to complete the subordination process as soon as possible, Committee supports emergency legislation. Report submitted by Phillips, Severt and Schweser.

Law & Ordinance Committee: Mr. Severt, Chairman, provided an oral report of notices of Liquor Permit Applications as follows:

DETAILED REPORT:

On January 11, 2021 this Committee met to consider a subordination loan agreement for Keystone Real Estate Group, LLC. This meeting was also attended by Council Members Rozell, Snee and Terwilliger, the Director of Public Service and Safety, and members of the City staff.

In 2020 Council approved a \$125,000 loan from the Small Business Development Revolving Loan Fund (SBD) to Keystone Real Estate Group, LLC for building improvements at 214 S. Mulberry Street. A second mortgage on property provided collateral for the loan. The SBD loan assisted with extensive building renovation costs which allowed the location to serve several office businesses and provided for interest only payments for the first six months. The payment status is current with Keystone Real Estate Group, LLC making the last of the interest only payments. The current loan balance is \$125,000.

Keystone Real Estate Group, LLC is now in the process of refinancing the primary bank mortgage from Greenville Federal Bank and is requesting the City of Troy execute a subordination agreement for the new lender, Minster Bank. This would keep the City of Troy mortgage in second position, but behind a different commercial lender. The City of Troy loan principal remains the same as no additional City funding is requested.

RECOMMENDATION:

This Committee recommends that legislation be prepared authorizing the Director of Public Service and Safety to execute a subordination loan agreement for Keystone Real Estate Group, LLC. So that the subordination process can be completed as soon as possible, the Committee supports emergency legislation.

SUMMARY REPORT: (to be read at Council meeting)

On January 11, Committee members Snee and Phillips met to consider recommending a safety study along West Main Street from Marybill Drive to I-75 Northbound Ramps. The safety study agreement includes the consultant assisting the City with a safety funding application to ODOT related to the improvement of Stanfield Road north to and through the intersection with Experiment Farm Road.

RECOMMENDATION: (to be read at Council meeting)

This Committee recommends that legislation be prepared authorizing the Director of Public Service and Safety to enter into a professional services agreement with the firm of American Structurepoint, Inc. at a cost not to exceed \$55,000 for a traffic study along West Main Street from Marybill Drive to the I-75 Northbound Ramps and assisting with an associated funding application.

DETAILED REPORT:

On January 11, 2021 Committee members Snee and Phillips met to consider a professional services agreement with the firm of American Structurepoint, Inc. to perform a safety study along a portion of West Main Street. This meeting was also attended by Council Members Rozell, Schweser, Severt and Terwilliger, the Director of Public Service and Safety, and members of the City staff.

The City has determined that the next project for Ohio Public Works Commission (OPWC) funding will be the improvement of Stanfield Road north to and through the intersection with Experiment Farm Road. The intersection of West Main Street and South Stanfield Road/Experiment Farm Road is one of the busiest in the City and is considered close to capacity. In 2019 the firm of American Structurepoint, Inc. performed an intersection feasibility study that evaluated the efficiency and capacity of operation, recommended lane configurations, and estimated the cost for the recommended improvements at this intersection. While no decision can yet be made, a round-a-bout is part of the analysis. The next step would be a safety study along West Main Street from Marybill Drive to I-75 Northbound Ramps. The study will include the six signalized intersections within the study area, with the consultant assisting the City in preparing and presenting an ODOT Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) safety funding application. The study and application processes will take approximately four months to complete. American Structurepoint, Inc. has the capability to provide the safety study, and provided a not to exceed cost of \$55,000 for the project.

RECOMMENDATION:

This Committee recommends that legislation be prepared authorizing the Director of Public Service and Safety to enter into a professional services agreement with the firm of American Structurepoint, Inc. at a cost not to exceed \$55,000 for a traffic study along West Main Street from Marybill Drive to the I-75 Northbound Ramps and assisting with an associated funding application.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE DIRECTOR OF PUBLIC SERVICE AND SAFETY OF THE CITY OF TROY, OHIO TO ENTER INTO AN AGREEMENT FOR PROFESSIONAL SERVICES WITH AMERICAN STRUCTUREPOINT, INC. WHEREAS, the City of Troy desires to have a safety study performed for the area of West Main Street from Marybill Drive to the Interstate-75 Northbound Ramps related to a future improvement of Stanfield Road and the intersection of Stanfield Road and West Main Street; and

WHEREAS, the consultant providing the safety study will also provide the City with assistance in the preparation and presentation of an Ohio Department of Transportation Highway Safety Improvement Program Safety Funding application; and

WHEREAS, City staff recommended that the firm of American Structurepoint, Inc. of Columbus, Ohio be authorized to provide the safety study for the area of West Main Street, from Marybill Drive and the Interstate-75 Northbound Ramps and the Safety Funding application assistance discussed herein.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Troy, as follows:

SECTION I: That the Director of Public Service and Safety of the City of Troy, Ohio is hereby authorized to enter into an Agreement with American Structurepoint, Inc. of Columbus, Ohio, for the scope of services to include a West Main Street Safety Study for the area of West Main Street from Marybill Drive to the Interstate-75 Northbound Ramps and assistance in the preparation and presentation of an Ohio Department of Transportation Highway Safety Improvement Program Safety Funding application related to the said area of West Main Street, in accordance with the Agreement now on file in the Office of the Director of Public Service and Safety, at a cost not to exceed Fifty-five Thousand Dollars and no/100 (\$55,000.00).

**ORDINANCE SUBORDINATING A MORTGAGE LIEN
FOR KEYSTONE REAL ESTATE GROUP, LLC AND
DECLARING AN EMERGENCY**

WHEREAS, the City of Troy received a mortgage lien on property located at 214 South Mulberry Street as security for a loan to Keystone Real Estate Group, LLC, and

WHEREAS, the property owner is refinancing with a new private commercial bank loan from Minster Bank, which is requiring a new first mortgage as security on the property and is requesting the City of Troy subordinate its existing second mortgage, and

WHEREAS, the property owner is current in loan repayments to the City of Troy,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Troy, Ohio, as follows:

SECTION I: That the Director of Public Service and Safety of the City of Troy, Ohio is hereby authorized to execute any documents necessary for the subordination of the lien at 214 South Mulberry Street for Keystone Real Estate Group, LLC from the City of Troy, Ohio to that of Minster Bank.

SECTION II: That the Law Director is hereby authorized and directed to cause the recording of any documents, to take any other action necessary, and to see that such subordination is properly filed and recorded.

SECTION III: That this Ordinance is an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, and safety of the City of Troy, Ohio, and for the further reason that the property owner needs to close on the new bank loan as soon as possible to pay off the previous commercial loan, **NOW, WHEREFORE**, this Ordinance shall be effective immediately upon its adoption and approval by the Mayor.

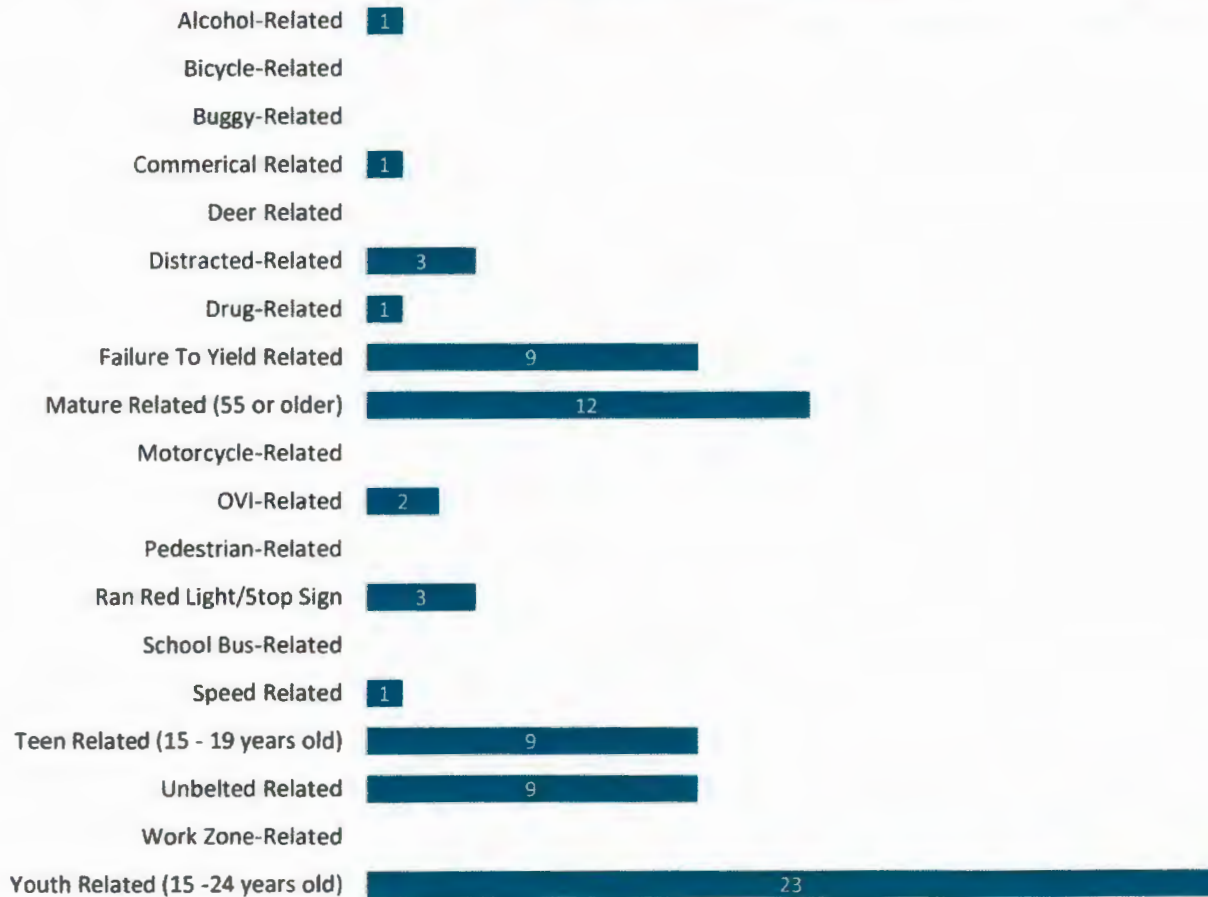

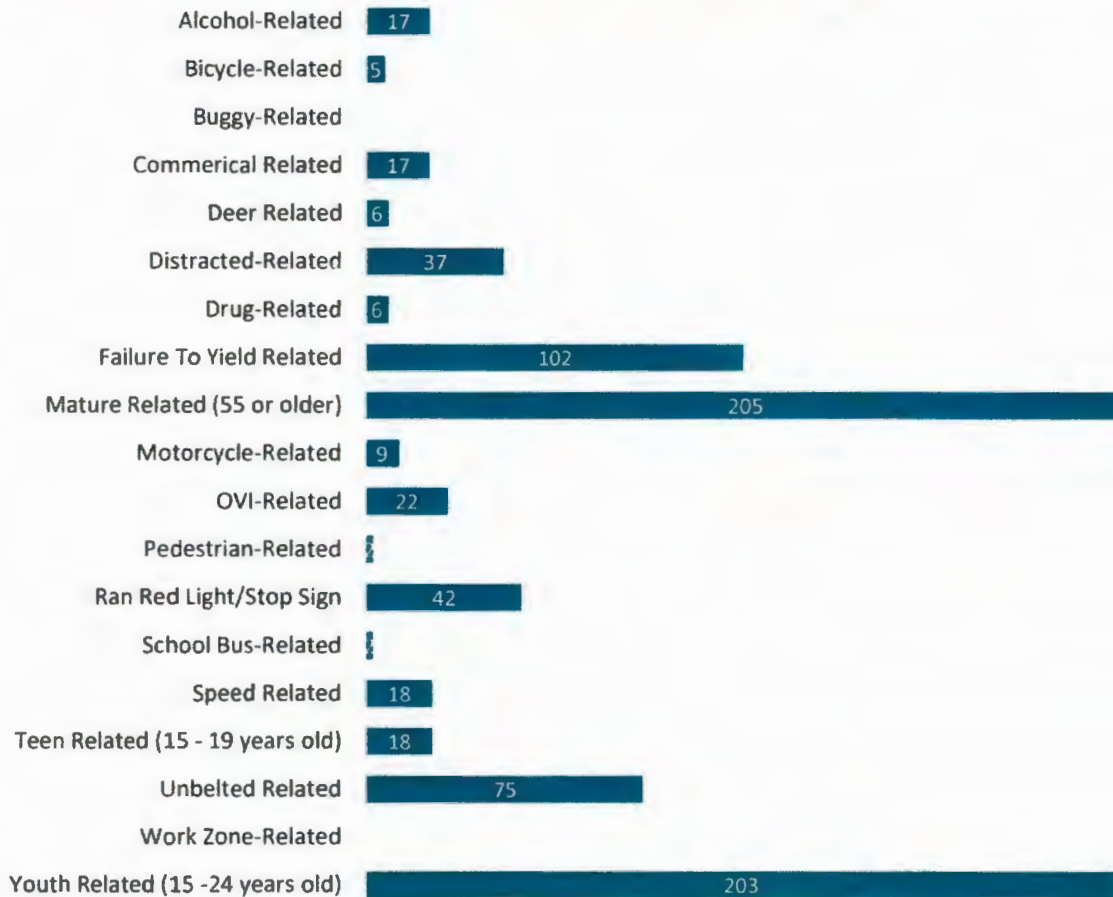
