Message from the Chief:

Crime rates in the City remained generally average, with some categories experiencing slight increases while others declined, including a notable drop in reported thefts. A focused, year-long effort to enforce drunk driving laws resulted in a 25% reduction in alcohol-related motor vehicle crashes in the City. However, several high-profile incidents in 2024 gained significant traction on social media, fueling a narrative that crime was spiraling out of control. False rumors surrounding these incidents contributed to this perception, along with accusations and criticism of the department's response. These situations highlighted the critical need for active social media monitoring, timely responses, and proactive dissemination of accurate information to counter misinformation before it spreads.

In 2024, the Troy Police Department underwent its quadrennial site-based accreditation assessment, earning its 10th accreditation award from the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA), a distinction it has held since 1993. To maintain accreditation, the department undergoes annual remote compliance reviews, in addition to a comprehensive on-site assessment every four years.

Regarding staffing challenges, the department began 2024 with four officer vacancies. Over the year, six new officers were hired, while three left the department. Among those who departed, one officer with six years of experience transferred to another law enforcement agency, another was released during their probationary period for performance reasons, and the third resigned from the field training program after requesting part-time work. By year's end, the department remained one officer short of full staffing.

Police Chiefs

The first Town Marshall was John Putterbaugh, elected by Council in 1830. A Town Marshall would continue to be elected by the Troy Council until 1874. Starting in 1874, the Town Marshall was elected to a two-year term by popular vote until 1900. In 1900, George Irwin was appointed the first Chief of Police after serving as Town Marshall since 1884.

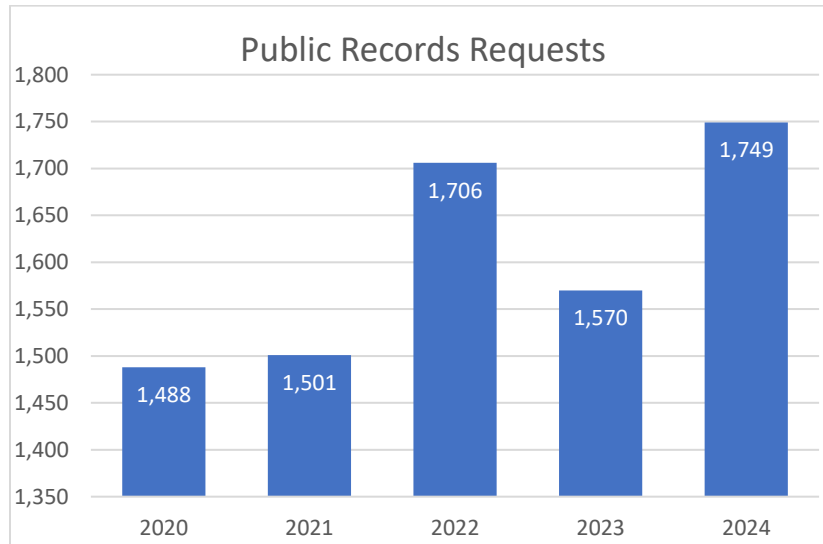
Troy Police Department Organizational Chart



Effective March 1, 2024

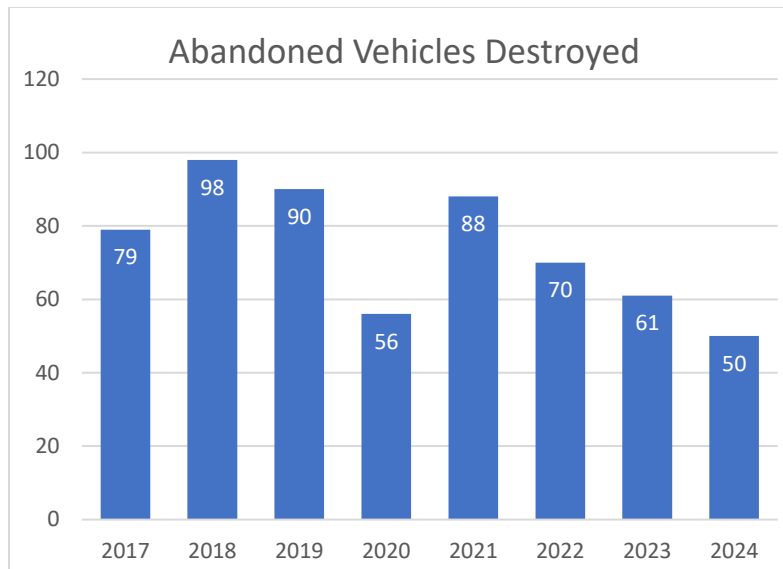
Administration Section

The Administrative Section was under the command of Captain Ryan Ormberg. Its primary responsibilities include records, parking control, hiring, Accreditation, and building maintenance.



In 2024, the records section responded to and provided 1,749 records requests. These requests can be as simple as a copy of a report or the time-consuming redactions for body camera footage. For every hour of video provided on a record request, it takes approximately 3 hours of labor to properly redact.

The Record's Section is responsible for several other duties, including several permits, inspections, grants, and the QRT team. Vendor's (door-to-door sales) permits and food truck permits are processed by the Records Section and approved by the Chief of Police. The Police Department conducts local record checks and a \$25 application fee is required. In 2024, there were 26 vendor's license applications, 1 was denied, for a total income of \$650. Twenty-one (21) food truck applications were received of which one was never completed, all others were approved for a total of \$525 collected in application fees. The parking control officer conducts low-speed vehicle inspections. Fifteen (15) slow-moving vehicles were inspected in 2024 for a total income of \$300.



In 2024 the Department disposed of 50 vehicles. The process is both time-consuming and creates significant postage costs. The postage costs in 2024 were \$635.

The Administrative section is responsible for two programs for which we receive grant money reimbursements. The first is a combination of Federal and State reimbursements for bullet-proof vests. By both contract and manufacturer's recommendation, our officers receive a new vest every 5 years. Under both of these programs, we received \$7,713 back in 2024.

The second program is the Quick Response Team (QRT) which began in 2016. The team consists of an addiction counselor, firefighter, and police officer who attempt to contact victims of overdoses and anyone else who may benefit from addiction recovery services inside the City of Troy. The costs associated with the team are reimbursable through a State Drug Abuse Response Team (DART) grant through the Ohio Attorney General's Office. The Administrative section is in charge of the applications and considerable reporting requirements. Last year \$16,519 in costs were reimbursed through the grant.

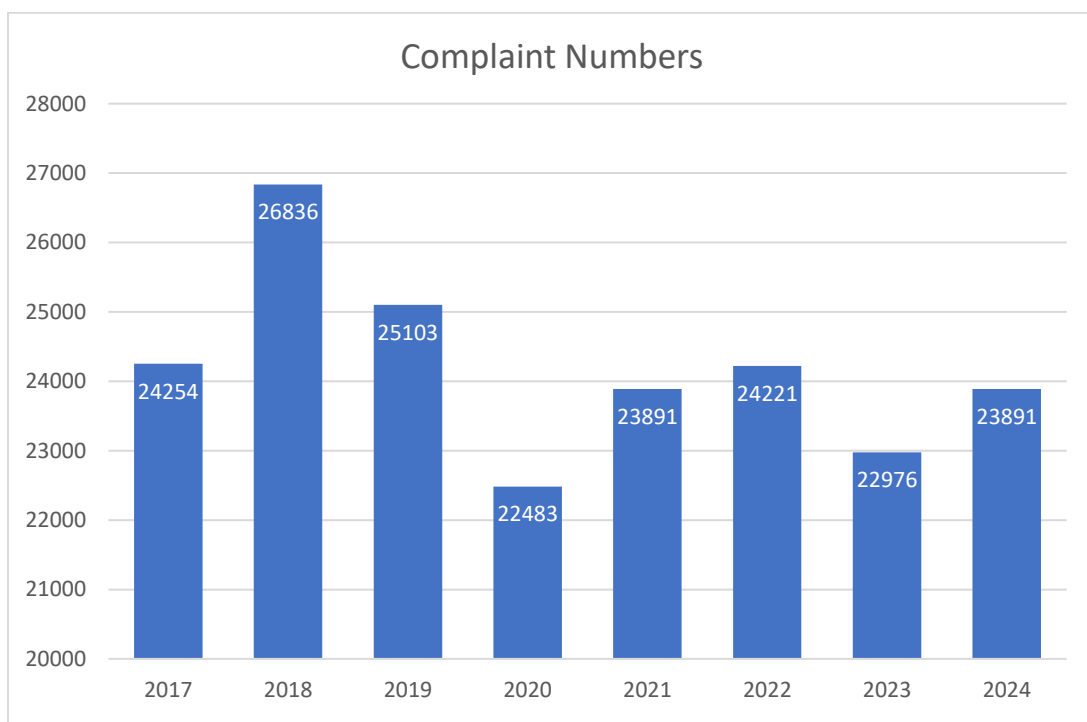
746 parking tickets were issued throughout the City by officers and the parking control officer. Fines paid directly to the Police Department totaled \$13,150 in 2024, compared to \$27,290 in 2023, or a 52% decrease in fines

collected. Parking tickets not paid to the Police Department are filed in Municipal Court. The Parking Control Officer, Kim Morse retired in July after 6 years of service, and former Police Officer, Todd Sloan was hired to replace him.

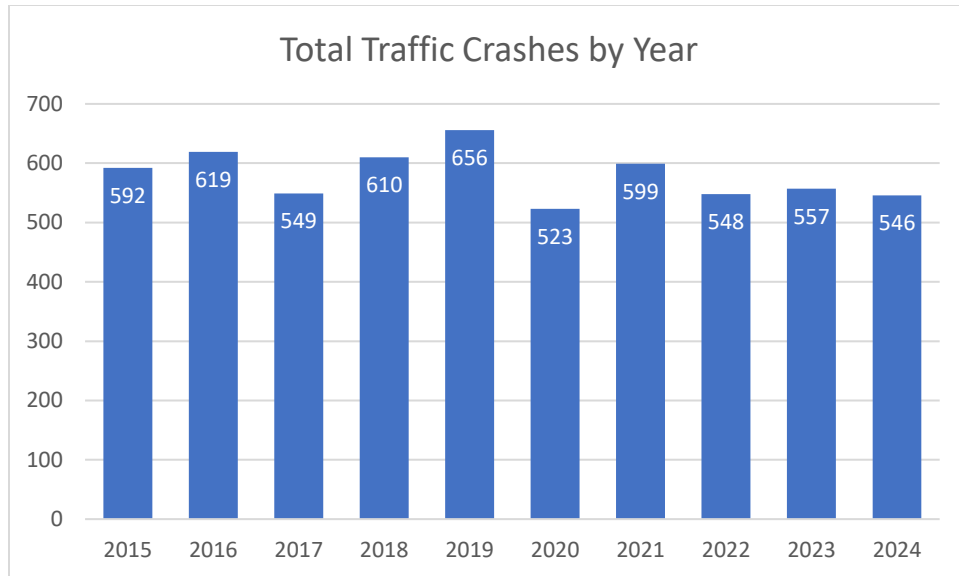
Major building projects in 2024 included the HVAC systems cooling tower, boilers, and pumps and repairs to our elevator.

Patrol Section

In 2024, the Patrol Section was led by Captain Zac Mumford. Reporting to him were six sergeants and 27 patrol officers. The section operated in three shifts, each overseen by two sergeants. As the largest unit within the department, staffing shortages frequently impacted the Patrol Section. On average, 2.6 officer positions were vacant per day. However, this figure does not account for officers on military leave, attending the police academy, or undergoing field training, as they are not included in minimum staffing levels.



One measure of the Patrol Section's activity is the number of complaint numbers generated annually, typically resulting from calls for service. In 2024, a total of 23,891 complaint numbers were recorded—an increase of 915 from 2023, reflecting a 4% rise.



A key responsibility of the Patrol Section is investigating traffic crashes and enforcing traffic laws to enhance road safety. In 2024, 546 traffic crash reports were completed within the city limits, marking a slight 0.02% decrease from the previous year. The top three crash locations were:

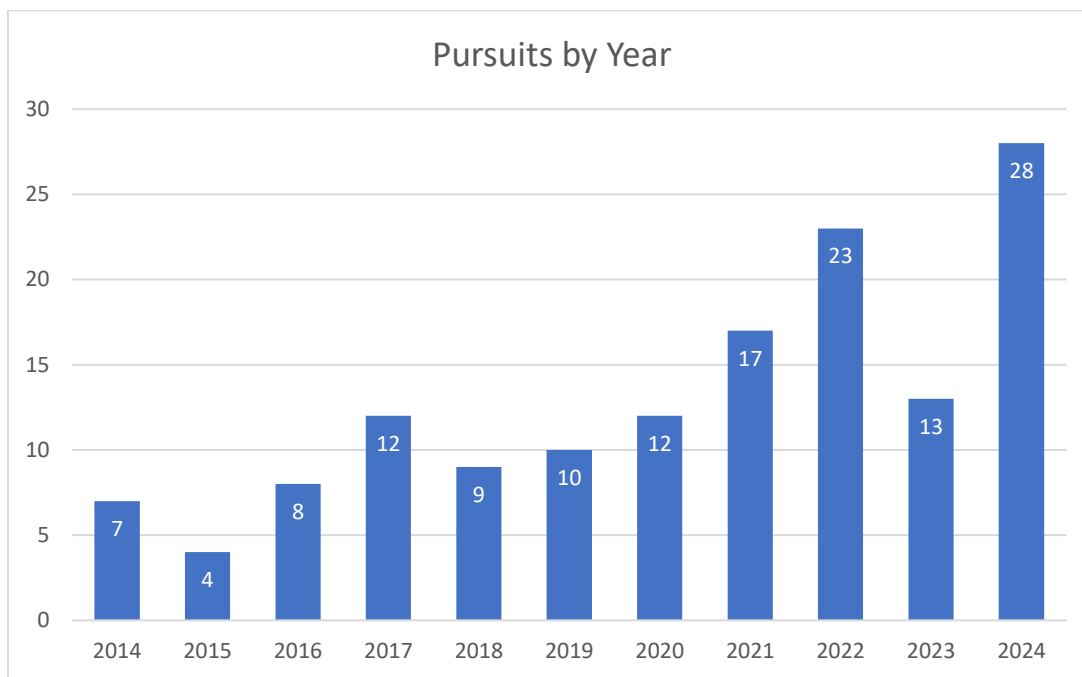
- **W. Main St./I-75** – 24 crashes (previously ranked 4th with 14 crashes)
- **Public Square** – 23 crashes (previously ranked 3rd with 19 crashes)
- **S. Market St./W. Market St.** – 21 crashes (previously unranked among top locations)

Factors contributing to these crash trends may include major construction on W. Main St., east of I-75, and changes to traffic signal operations at S. Market St./W. Market St.

In 2024, officers conducted **5,245 traffic stops**, issuing **1,722 traffic citations** and **4,397 warnings**.

One of the Patrol Section's goals for 2024 was to reduce OVI-related crashes. In 2023, the City recorded 25 such incidents. By increasing enforcement efforts, the number of OVI-related crashes dropped to 19 in 2024, reflecting a **25% reduction**.

One fatal traffic crash occurred within city limits during the year. On March 18, a 70-year-old woman lost control of her eastbound vehicle on W. Main St., near S. Dorset Rd. Her vehicle crossed the center line, entered a construction zone where the roadway had been removed, the vehicle dropped, and ultimately came to rest against a small tree.



Pursuits saw a **115% increase** compared to 2023. Officers attempted to deploy spike strips for other jurisdictions in three of these cases but did not engage in pursuit. In another one of these instances, officers were responding to a pursuit from another jurisdiction when the suspect crashed before our officers engaged. Of the **28 reported pursuits**, officers terminated 10. For a more detailed analysis, refer to the Patrol Captain's annual pursuit review.

Investigative Section

In 2024, the Investigative Section was led by Captain Dominic Burnside. This section primarily handled investigations conducted by three detectives and oversaw the School Resource Officer (SRO) program. One SRO was assigned to the six elementary schools, another to the Junior High School, and one to the High School.

During the summer, the section organized programs such as Safety Town and Crime Scene Camp. Additionally, SRO's participated in various community events, including National Night Out Against Crime, Career Day at the County Fairgrounds for Junior High students, and Trunk or Treat with Children's Services.

In addition to assisting the Patrol Section with numerous cases, detectives were assigned 140 high-profile and complex investigations in 2024. Meanwhile, SRO's handled 83 cases and/or school-related calls for service, the majority originating from the High School. The section also conducted active shooter training for 5 businesses and 5 schools.

Throughout the year, the Investigative Section continued working closely with the Child Advocacy Center (CAC) in Troy. Detectives handled 29 cases in collaboration with the multi-disciplinary team when children either witnessed violence or were victims of crimes.

Summary of Major Cases:

- **Shooting (22TR15919)** – Convictions for the brazen daytime shooting on August 24, 2022, in the crowded Community Park were finalized. Solving the case relied heavily on using technology due to the lack of any significant cooperation. Five people were convicted for their involvement:
 - Derrick Peebles: Guilty of Attempted Aggravated Murder, Conspiracy, and Felonious Assault, sentenced to 9 years in prison

- Courtney McCarel-Kraska: Guilty of Attempted Aggravated Murder, Conspiracy, Felonious Assault, and Tampering with Evidence, sentenced to 6 years in prison
- Jesse Alexander: Guilty of Attempted Felonious Assault, sentenced to 2 ½ years in prison
- Todd Norris: Guilty of Attempted Aggravated Trafficking in Drugs, sentenced to 1 year in prison
- Aundrey Payne: Guilty of Attempted Tampering with Evidence, sentenced to 7 months in prison.
- **Missing Juvenile (24TR02133)** - Ellie Carder was reported missing on February 2 and found deceased in the river on March 3. No foul play was suspected.
- **Robbery (24TR04401)** - The One Stop Drive Thru was robbed at gunpoint on March 7. The case was closed with the arrest of Joseph Herford, who later pleaded guilty on December 17 and was sentenced to 8 years in prison.
- **Motor Vehicle Theft (24TR05511)** - A stolen vehicle was recovered at Motel 6 on March 26. The investigation led to Tyler Hudson being charged with two counts of Receiving Stolen Property. He was convicted on one count and sentenced to seven months in prison, along with restitution to the victim and court costs. The investigation led Montgomery County law enforcement agencies to identify Tyler Hudson as being responsible for similar crimes in their jurisdictions and filed appropriate charges.
- **Child Endangering/Arson (24TR07568)** - A structure fire at 421 W. Canal St. on April 26 led to Child Endangering charges against Erica Ingram. She was sentenced to 90 days (suspended) and court costs, to be served concurrently with 2-3 years in prison for possession of 24.98 grams of methamphetamine, which was discovered during a later traffic stop related to the Child Endangering warrant.
- **Shots fired/suicide (24TR11993)** - A suspect fired a shotgun at his girlfriend's husband and 9-year-old daughter. Neither

was injured. The suspect was later stopped by Fayette County Sheriff's Deputies on US 35, where he died from a self-inflicted gunshot wound.

- **Robbery (24TR12809)** - A robbery at gunpoint involving marijuana occurred at 106 W. Canal St. The investigation led to the arrests of Lamarr Parker and Trevor Maenle, both sentenced to 7 to 9 years in prison.
- **Stabbing (24TR14312)** - A stabbing occurred at 1024 Walker St. on August 2. The victim survived. The investigation remains active.
- **Shooting Threat at Hobart Welding (24TR15295)** - On August 15, a student made a social media threat to "shoot up the school." Margaret Franc was arrested for Making False Alarms, expelled from school, and later found guilty of a reduced charge, resulting in a \$250 fine.
- **Stabbing (24TR15662)** - On August 20, a stabbing took place at 246 S. Union St. following a dispute between two men who each had a child with the same woman. Michael McBride was arrested nearby and sentenced to 14 months in prison.
- **Breaking and Entering (24TR17657)** - On September 20, Monkey's Smoke Shop (1291 S. Dorset Rd.) was broken into during the early morning hours. The suspect shattered windows and stole the cash register, which contained no cash. Donnell Harris was arrested and convicted of theft, receiving six months in jail and a \$150 fine. In addition, Multiple smoke shops were broken into within Montgomery County around this same time frame, and due to our collaborative effort with outside agencies, Donnell Harris was identified as being responsible and was convicted on multiple additional counts of breaking & entering. He was sentenced to 5 years of probation in Montgomery County.

Training

Highlights of training this year.

- *2 detectives attended a homicide/death investigation school*
- *2 detectives attended interview and interrogation schools*
- *2 officers attended a property/evidence management school*
- *9 officers attended Advanced Roadside Impaired Driving Enforcement (ARIDE)*
- *Five (5) officers attending their initial Precision Immobilization Technique (PIT) training and Nineteen (19) were recertified through in-service training.*
- *A new range officer attended courses to teach/qualify officers in the State mandated pistol, rifle, and shotgun qualifications.*

- *An existing range officer attended the course to teach/qualify officers in the State mandate shotgun qualification*
- *2 range officers attended armorer school for the FN509 pistol*
- *32 officers went through active shooter video scenarios with the Ohio School Safety Center (OSSC).*
- *4 officers attended Crisis Intervention Training (CIT)*
- *1 officer attended SRO school*
- *4 officers attending Field Training Officer (FTO) school*
- *4 officers attended Mental Health First Aid for Public Safety*
- *The new parking control officer attended first aid training*
- *All employees attended harassment prevention training provided by the HR Department.*

Staffing Levels

Police Departments nationwide continue to struggle with hiring qualified candidates. As mentioned in the Message from the Chief, the Troy Police Department, led by the Administrative Section, hired 6 officers and replaced the parking control officer in 2024.

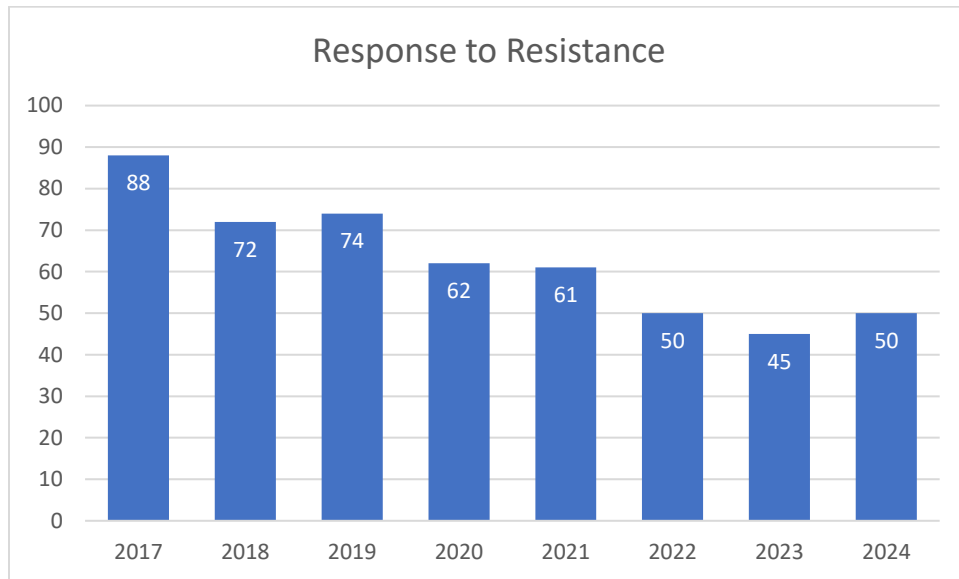
The approved 2024 budget added a sworn officer position, unit #444 to our roster. The budget also sets forth plans to transition the role of Property Room and Accreditation Manager to an additional non-sworn staff position in 2025. This will effectively increase the number of officers in an enforcement role.

The average daily vacancy rate was 2.6 officers in 2024. This number does not completely explain staffing challenges due to officers who are not eligible to count toward minimum patrol staffing levels. In 2024 one officer was deployed with the military for most of the year, five officers were in police academies for portions of the year, and new officers were assigned to a field training program they must complete before counting toward minimum staffing.

Accreditation

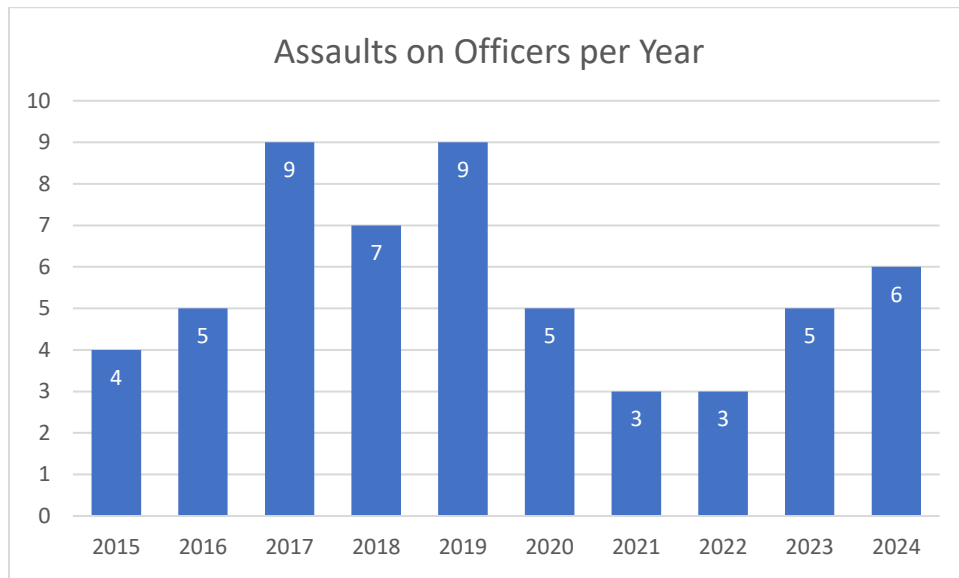
The Troy Police Department maintained its accreditation through the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA) and Ohio Collaborative. In 2024 the Department has had an annual web-based review of approximately ¼ of CALEA's standards and its every 4-year site-based assessment. The web-based assessment found 2 standards issues that were corrected by the time of the site-based assessment. The site-based assessment report was favorable and the Department was awarded its 10th accreditation award at the CALEA conference in November. The Troy Police Department has maintained CALEA Accreditation since 1993.

Response to Resistance



The Department tracks and reviews internally all uses of force (Response to Resistance). In 2024 there were 50 use-of-force reports, of which 21 were incidents where officers only displayed their firearm or Taser. Overall, this represents a 10% increase in the use of force from last year but still a reduction in the average since 2017. The Department further examines its response to resistance in the annual Use of Force Analysis completed by the Patrol Captain in January of each year.

Assaults on Officers



Six (6) officers were assaulted in 2024, representing a 20% increase from 2023, making the 10-year average of 5.6 officer assaults per year. The Department further examines assaults on officers, which is completed by the Patrol Captain in January of each year.

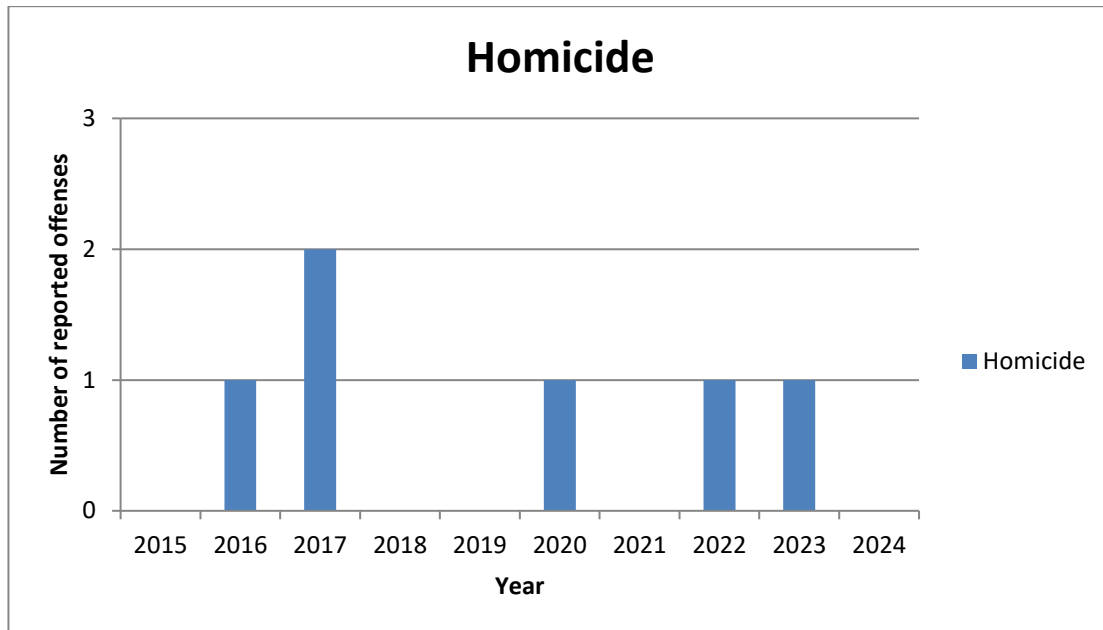

Each City ward, when set up after the 2020 Census, had approximately the same population, 4,400 residents. Set-up errors in our records management system may have slightly affected early 2023 results. The number represents all calls assigned a complaint number, within the City, to the Troy Police Department. Calls handled by the Miami County Sheriff's Office, Ohio State Highway Patrol, or any other agency are not included above.

Ward 2 had the highest amount of calls with 5,227, followed by Ward 5, then Ward 3.

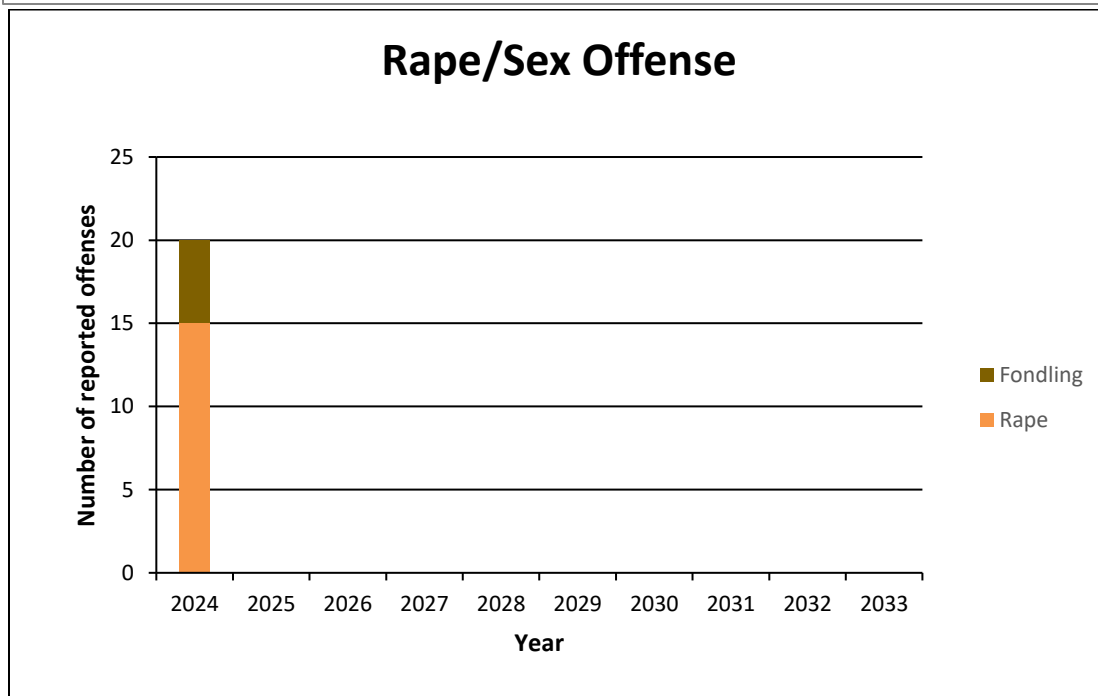
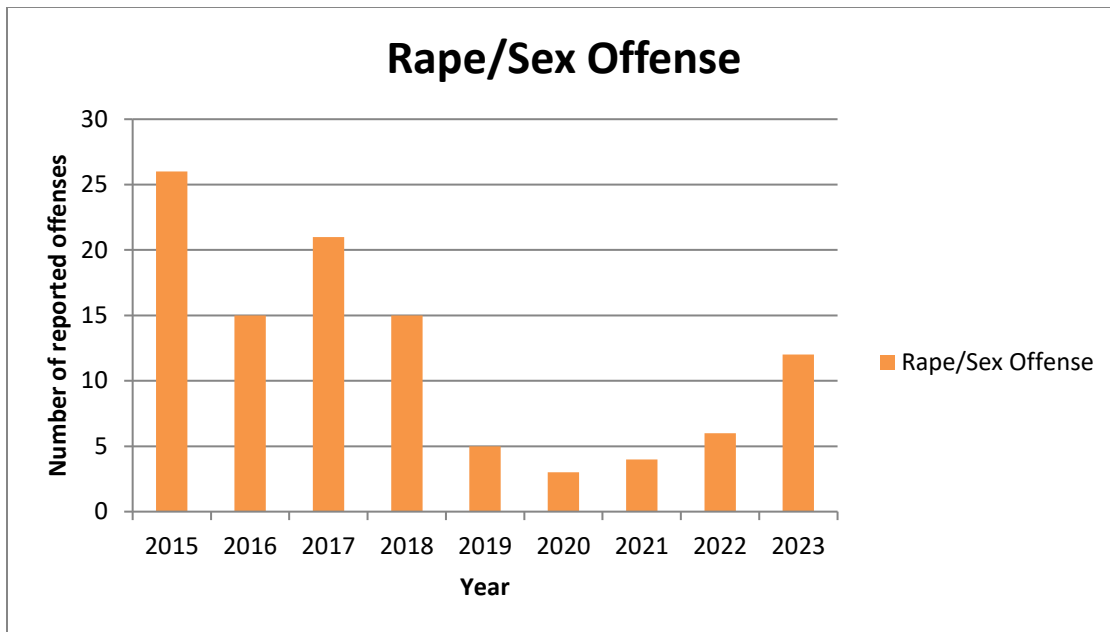
Crime Statistics

Part 1 Crimes



Homicides: There were no homicide reports in Troy in 2024. In the past 10 years, there have been 6 homicides reported in Troy, and all have been cleared by arrest.

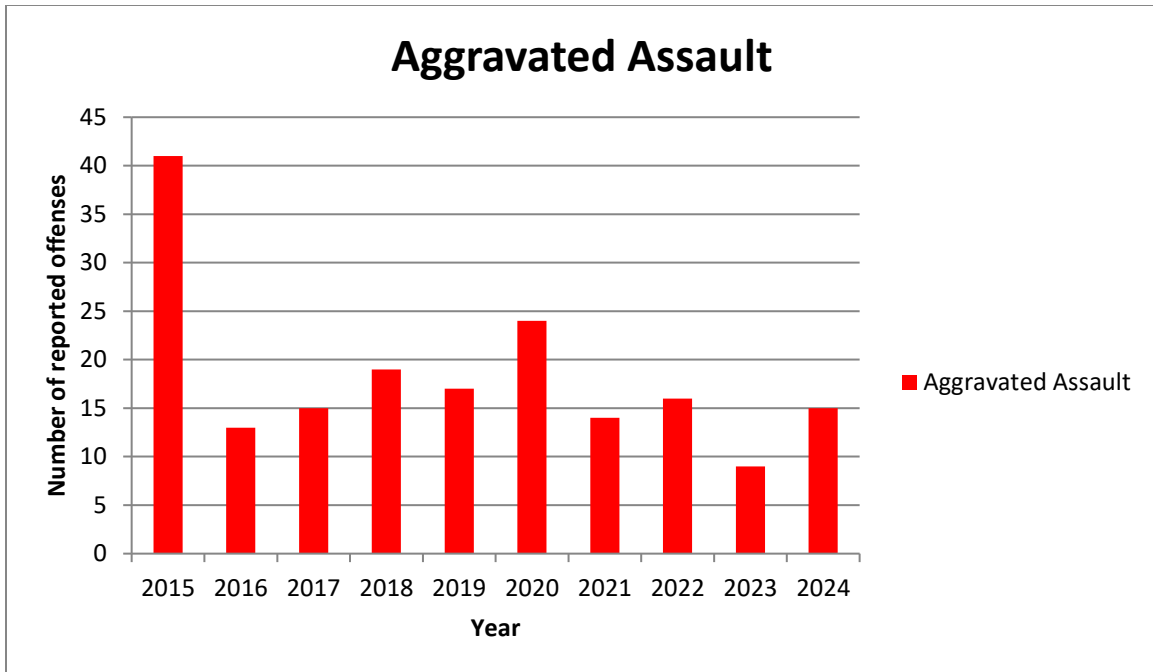

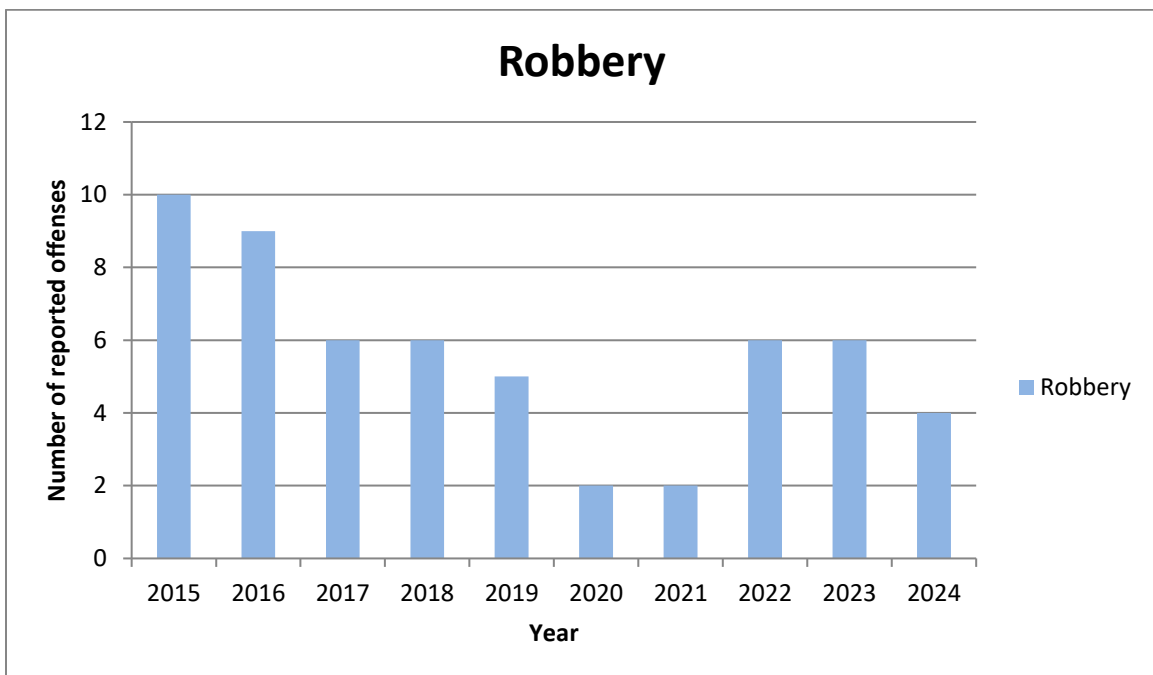
Rape: There were 20 reported sex offenses in Troy in 2024. FBI offense codes reported in this category include rape, sodomy, sexual assault with an object, fondling, and statutory rape. Changes in reporting make it difficult to compare to previous years therefore a new chart has been added. Other facts include:

- Fifteen (15) reports fell into the categories of rape/sodomy, five (5) reports as fondling.

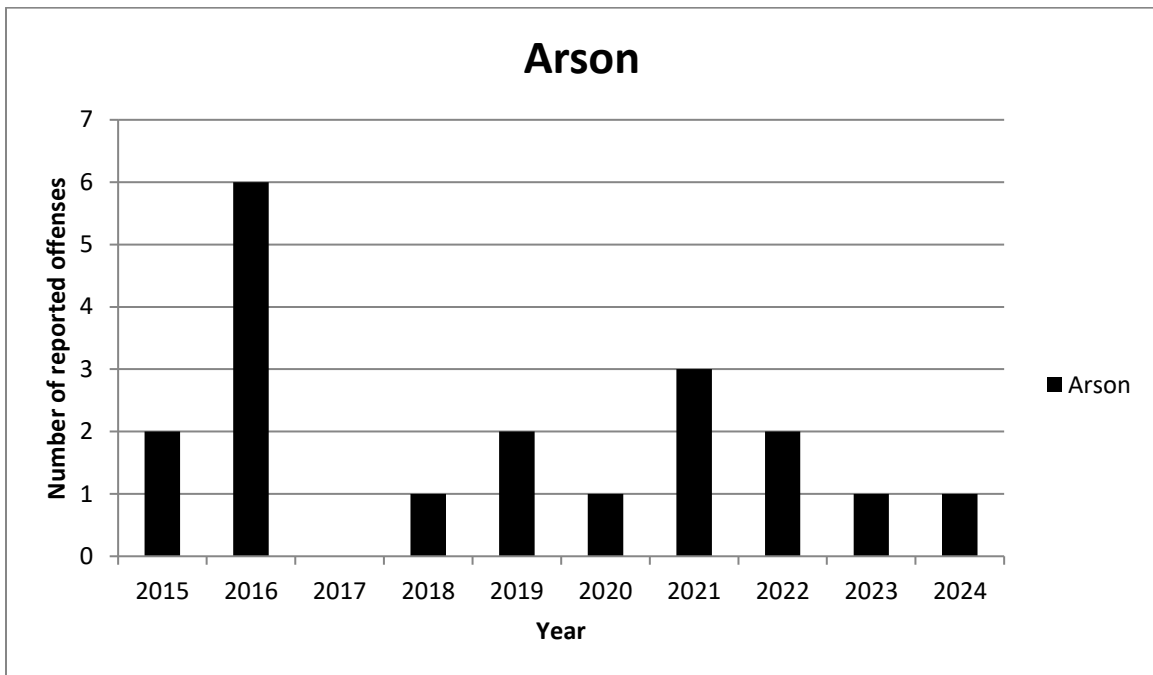
- In the five (5) fondling cases:
 - Two (2) cases were closed because the allegations did not meet the elements of a crime.
 - Two (2) cases were closed because the victim requested no prosecution or refused to cooperate with the investigation after the initial disclosure
 - One (1) report was closed by arrest. The suspect was convicted of a lesser charge and received 30 days in jail, suspended, contingent on no-like offenses for 2 years and fined \$100.
 - Two (2) victims were juvenile females, two (2) were adult females, and one (1) was a juvenile male.
 - The relationship between the suspect and victim were two (2) friends, one (1) sibling, one (1) ex-spouse, and one (1) stranger. The arrest was made in the case involving a stranger.
- In the rape/sodomy cases:
 - Seven (7) cases did not find sufficient evidence to file charges
 - In Five (5) cases the victim stated they did not want to pursue a charge or stopped cooperating in follow-up interviews
 - In one (1) case probable cause was found for an arrest, however, Common Pleas Prosecutors did not bring the case to a grand jury due to insufficient evidence for trial.
 - One (1) adult female reported being a victim in two separate and unrelated cases.
 - In one (1) case involving juveniles, case law did not allow for a conviction.
 - In another case involving juveniles an arrest was made.
 - The victims were reported as:
 - 10 – Adult females
 - 3 – Juvenile females
 - 2 – Juvenile males
 - The relationship between the victim and suspect was reported as:
 - 12 – Acquaintance, friend, or otherwise known
 - 2 – Siblings
 - 1 – Parent



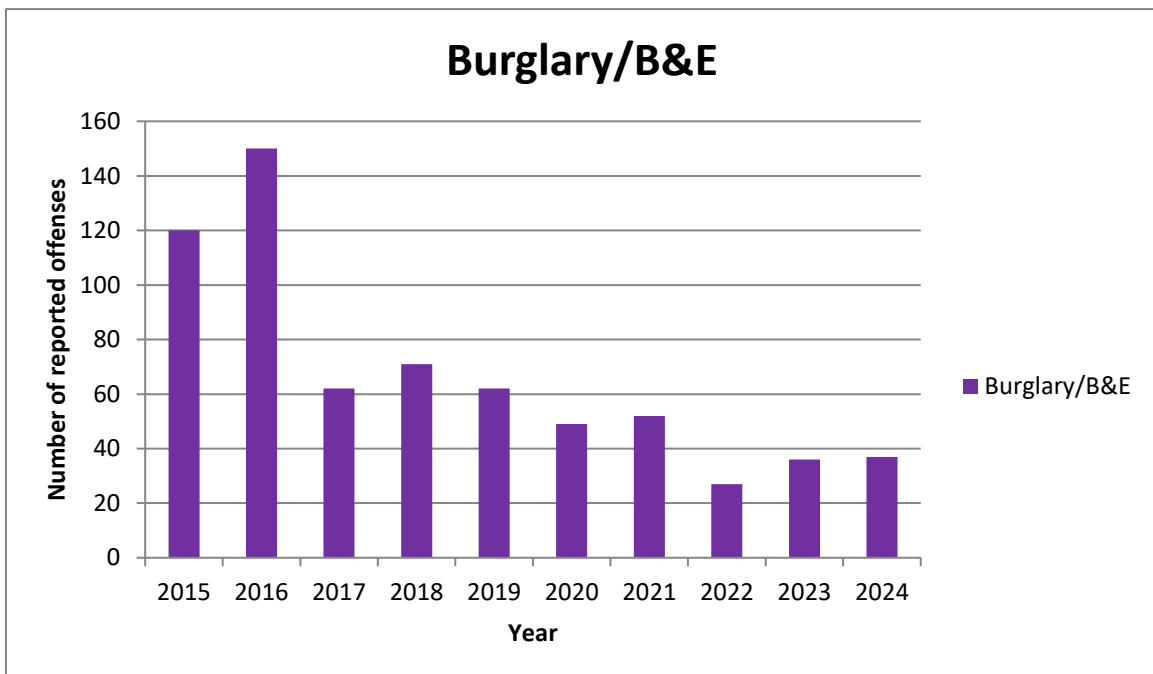
Aggravated Assault: There were 15 reported aggravated assaults in Troy in 2024. Aggravated assaults are defined as those in which serious physical harm is caused, or the victim is threatened with a deadly weapon (gun or knife).



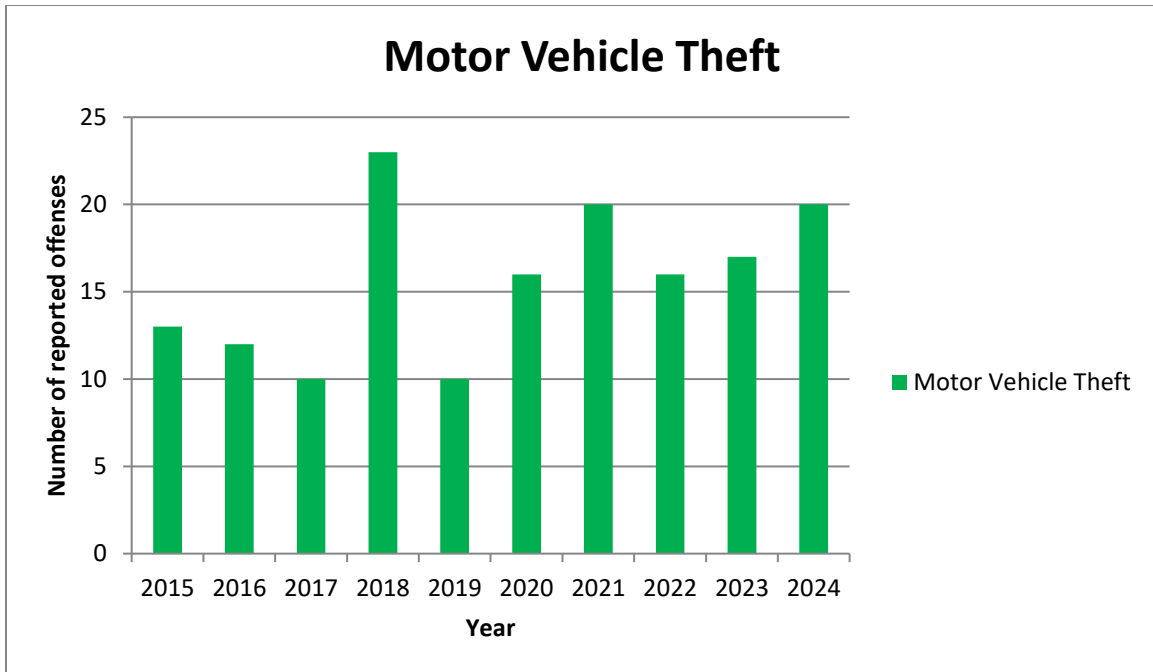
Robbery: There were four (4) reported robberies in Troy in 2024 of which three (3) were cleared by arrest. Two (2) were robberies of businesses and two (2) were robberies of individuals. In three (3) robberies, guns were displayed.



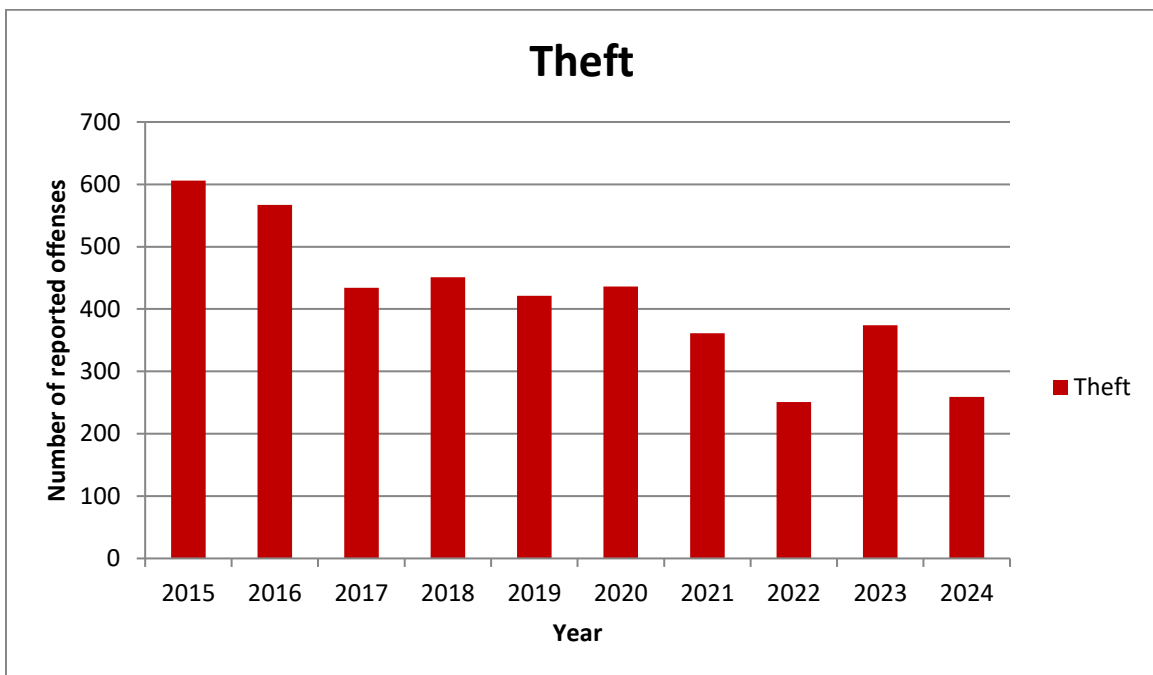
Arson: There was one (1) suspected arson in Troy in 2024. The case involved an abandoned shed in the woods east of Boyer Park.



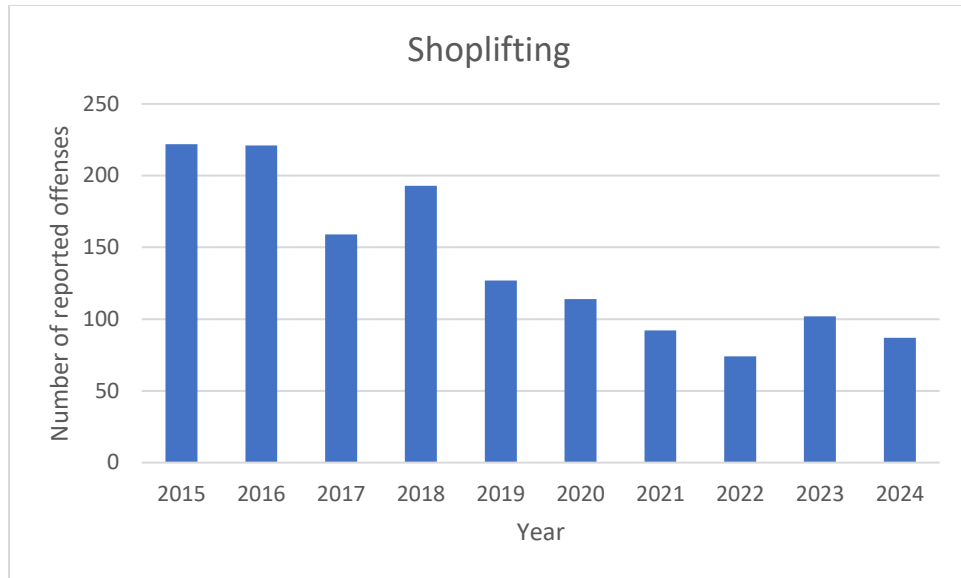
Burglary: There were 37 reported burglaries/B&E's in Troy in 2024.



Auto Theft: There were twelve (20) reported motor vehicle thefts in Troy in 2024. The makes included 5 Dodge's, 4 Chevrolet's, 2 Ford's, and one each of a BMW, Chrysler, GMC, Harley Davidson, Honda, Infiniti, Lexus, Mercury, and a Suzuki motorcycle.



Theft: There were 259 reported thefts in Troy in 2024.

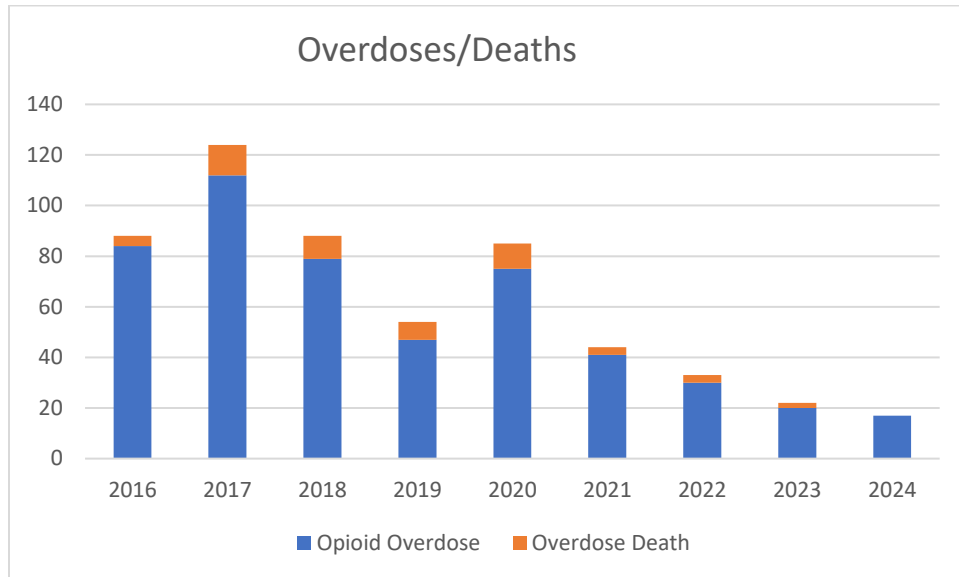


Shopliftings are included in theft reports.

The overall decline in thefts is also reflected in the 87 shoplifting incidents reported in 2024 inside the City. Officers often attribute this decrease to fewer calls by and/or a reduction in loss prevention staff at the City's big-box stores.

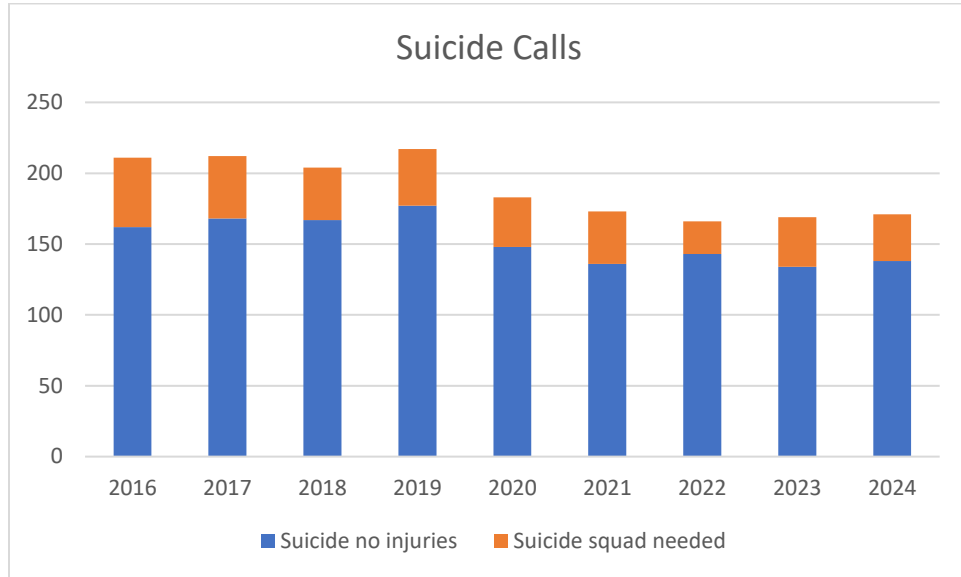
The past years' crime statistics are obtained from the Department's RMS. Previous years are reconciled with statistics reported to the State and FBI. The crimes documented above are those that have traditionally been reported as Part 1 Crimes of the FBI's Uniform Crime Report (UCR). FBI crime statistics are usually not released until the fall of the following year.

Opioid Overdoses/Deaths



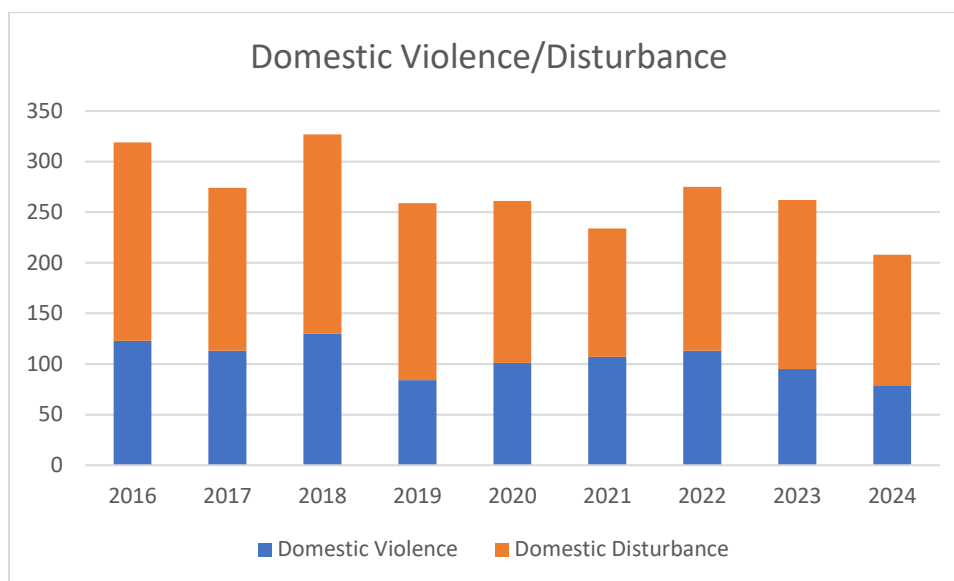
Reported suspected opioid overdoses decreased in 2024. The Police Department continued to participate in the Quick Response Team with Troy FD and the Sunrise Treatment Center in an attempt to bring resources to those who overdosed or have a suspected drug or alcohol addiction. The team attempted to contact 123 individuals in 2024 and contacted 28 and 14 family members, one of whom agreed to receive services. Suicide Calls



Troy officers were dispatched to 171 suicide/attempted suicide calls in 2024. Dispatchers classify these calls into 2 types, suicide without injury and suicide attempts where a squad is needed. In 2024, 138 of these calls did not need a squad and in 33 calls a squad was dispatched to the scene. This only includes calls that are dispatched as suicides/attempted suicides. Officers frequently come across individuals who will tell an officer they are having suicidal thoughts on calls such as welfare checks or after an arrest.

Domestic Violence



In 2024, Troy officers determined that 208 disturbances involved domestic partners or family members. Of those 208 disturbances, 79 were reported as domestic violence, which usually results in an arrest, and 129 were labeled as domestic disturbances, which is defined as having no threats, attempts, or physical harm to a family or household member.

The following pages are provided as references for the number of calls and types of offenses reported to the Troy Police Department in 2024. However, there are key differences in the 2 reports that are explained here.

The first is the “Total CAD Calls Received, by Nature of Call” report. Each documented incident in our Records Management System (RMS) must have a “Call Nature”, but it can only have one. The nature is usually entered by a Dispatcher based upon their knowledge from the reporting person. The officer may change the call nature in our report system, but since only one may be entered, it is the most serious or a general description of the incident.

The second report is the “Law Incident Reports by Offense Codes.” Incident reports may have multiple “Offense Codes” but none are required. The officer completing the report is responsible for entering the “Offense Codes.” This allows for tracking of multiple offenses or issues on the same incident report. For example, an officer arrests a person on a warrant, and in the process of searching the person they find illegal drugs. The officer should enter 2 offense codes, warrant and drug possession.

The list of “Call Natures” is different than “Offense Codes.”
